CICADA, for readers ages 14 and up, publishes original fiction, poetry, first-person nonfiction, and comics by both adult and teen writers and artists. In some cases, CICADA purchases rights for excerpts from books yet to be published. Each edition also includes reprints of high-quality selections. Please keep in mind that CICADA's readers are intelligent and sophisticated and can handle complexity with respect to theme, characterization, and plotting. The editors want to provide a balance of serious and humorous writing within each edition.

Call for Submissions: Maps & Monsters



Cicada's out to fill an upcoming issue with krakens, ogres, and other beasties, literal and figurative. We're interested in the monstrous as dangerous and strong; in monsters that lurk without and within. Monsters may show up on maps (especially weatherbeaten old sea charts), though largely as shorthand for the uncharted and unnamed. We're interested in the way maps help navigate the wilderness, inspire exploration, and track relationships, spatial and otherwise.

Send us poetry, fic (genre/realistic), essay, and comics on maps & monsters! Include "Maps and Monsters" in front of your submission's title to be considered.

General Submissions: Categories

Fiction and novella

- · We are interested in realistic, contemporary, and historical fiction, as well as humor, mysteries, fantasy, and science fiction.
- Length: up 05,000 words; we will consider novellas up to 9,000 words

Nonfiction

- · We would like to see first-person experiences of interest to teen and young adult readers
- Length: up to 5,000 words

Poetry

- CICADA publishes serious, humorous, rhyming or free verse.
- · Length: up to 25 lines

Submit your Story

Format like a pro

Include

- Use a 1" margin on all sides.
- Do not number the first page.
- Put your name and contact information at the top, centered, on the first page.
- Put the word count in the top right corner.
- Put the story's title, centered in all caps, approximately one-third of the way down the page from the top margin.
- Skip a line and write "by" in lowercase, then skip another line and put your name in all caps.
- Drop four lines, indent, and begin your story.
- Double-space the entire text of the story.
- Put a header at the top of every page (except the first) including the title, your last name, and page number).





Who's who

Agent

Editor

- Represents your book
- Pitches it to editors
- Negotiates contracts
- Schmoozes
- Keeps track of \$\$
- Negotiates foreign, film, audio rights, etc.

- Works for the publishing house
- Makes offer on the book.
- Works with you on revisions.
- Coordinates jacket copy, cover, etc.

Finding an Agent

Research

Stalk (not really)

- Publishers Marketplace (www.publishersmarketplace.com)
- Agent Query (www.agentquery.com)
- Query Tracker (www.querytracker.net)
- Writers Market (www.writersmarket.com)



- Read their guidelines.
- Follow them on Twitter.
- Read interviews with them on blogs.

Query Process

- Select 5-6 agents from your list.
- Check individual agent's guidelines.
- Put together 'query package'
 - Query letter (or email)
 - o Synopsis (250-300 words)
 - Sample (first 30 pages or three chapters)
- Submit
- Wait
- Send full manuscripts if requested.
- Wait some more.
- If no offer, move on to the next agents on your list.

Do Not

- Spam agents or editors with queries.
- Call.
- Hit up writers you don't know for referrals.
- Lose patience with the process.
- Take rejection personally.

Query Letter

Pitch the book to the agent!

Dear Ms. Mark:

After attending your panel discussion at the SCBWI Mid-Atlantic conference, I believe my young adult science fiction novel, <u>Memento Nora</u>, would be a good fit for your house. The novel is complete at approximately 40,000 words.

<u>Memento Nora grew out my short story of the same name, which appeared in the May /</u> June 2008 issue of *Odyssey Magazine*. The novel is about a teenage girl's struggle to hold on to her memories—and her identity—in a world that finds it far more lucrative for everyone to forget—and keep on shopping. Think M.T. Anderson's <u>Feed</u> or Scott <u>Westerfeld's Extras</u> meets *Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind*.

After a varied career, including over a decade at NASA's Kennedy Space Center, I recently turned to writing full time. In the past two years, I've sold dozens of short stories, including several young adult science fiction tales to *Odyssey*. I'm a member of the SFWA as well as the SCBWI.

I've included a short synopsis and the first 30 pages of the manuscript for your consideration. I'd be happy to send you the full manuscript, if you are interested.


