





 - What do people eat?
 - What do they do for fun?
- People
 - What kind of beings live in your world?



Sworn man (*burrnesha*)






Roman Steampunk

Showing vs. Telling


Do (Show)

Avoid (Tell)

- Weave details and clues into the story as you go along.
- Make words do "double duty"
 - Ex. "The door dilated open."

- Infodumps
- "As you know Bob" dialogue
- Explaining too much.

Good Examples of Showing

Avoid infodumps.


